





"Much more has become known about the unsuitability of animal models for studying human disease and many more humane, cost-effective, and scientifically suitable non-animal models are now available." Congressional Letter to Dr. Collins "Recognizing that humane, cost-effective, and scientifically suitable non-animal methods are available but underutilized, the Committee requests that NIH assemble a panel to investigate and make recommendations regarding incentives for more quickly and effectively moving NIH intramural and external research away from methods that rely on animals to methods that rely on non-animal alternatives." 


House Election Results 2020



The partisan divide narrows in both Chambers.



- First woman in a leadership role on E&C.
- Interested in pediatric conditions particularly Down Syndrome.
- Supported the Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act of 2007.
- Frequently engaged with NIH.

 - M.D. from University of Texas Medical Branch.


Rep.-elect Mariannette Miller-Meeks M.D. (IA-02)
