Snapshot of OLPA Congressional Activity

OLPA has:

- Had over 150 briefings for members of congress and staff.
- Responded to over 150 requests for information.
- Hosted 10 campus visits.
- Had over 40 meetings with NIH leadership.
- Five congressional hearings.

OLPA began hosting Friday NIH Lunch & Learns for congressional staff.

- Hosted 39 Lunch & Learns.
- Variety of topics, with the assistance of 33 NIH ICOs.
- 515 House staffers in attendance.
- 401 Senate staffers in attendance.

NIH Reauthorization Proposals

- A variety of ideas have been proposed for an NIH reauthorization bill.
- Senate HELP and House Energy & Commerce both released proposals during the 118th Congress indicating NIH reauthorization was overdue.
 - Issued public RFIs requesting input on ideas.
- Some of the topics discussed include:
 - Maximizing the effectiveness of current NIH funding.
 - Restoring public trust in science.
 - Sustaining the U.S. competitive advantage in biomedical research.
 - Reforms to NIH structure and leadership.
- We expect continued interest during the 119th Congress.



Newly Elected Members Joining the 118th Congress

- NJ-09: Democrat Nellie Pou won the special and general election.
- WI-08: Republican Tony Wied won the special and general election. Rep. Wied was sworn in November 12.
- NJ: In an arrangement laid out by the governor when former Senator Menendez resigned
 and the governor appointed George Helmy as Senator, Helmy agreed to step down so
 that Senator-elect Andy Kim can start work this year as a Senator. Helmy resigned from
 the Senate on Dec. 8 and Kim was sworn in the next day.
- CA: Senator-elect Adam Schiff resigned from his House district on Dec. 8 and was sworn in as the newest Senator from California.
- Getting sworn in as new Members this Congress gives Pou, Wied, Kim, and Schiff seniority over the rest of the freshman class and means they will get better room and committee assignments.

End of year To-Do List

- FY25 Appropriations. Congress is expected to pass a second FY25 CR providing funding through mid-March.
- Disaster Supplemental. Administration requested approximately \$100 billion in supplemental emergency discretionary appropriations in response to the recent hurricanes and other natural disasters
- **FY25 NDAA.** For the last 63 years, Congress has enacted a defense authorization bill. Both chambers have put forward their own versions which must be reconciled into a final package that can pass both chambers. There is often NIH-related language in the NDAA.
- End-of-Year Health Package. Congress considering a health care policy package.
- Oversight Investigations. House has to wrap up all investigations by the end of the year.
- Committee Reports. Many committees will issue final reports (some on what the cmte has
 done this year/Congress and others on specific issues).
- Farm Bill Reauthorization. Congress considering another extension.

Topline Numbers: 77 new Members, including: 12 newly elected Senators; 63 newly elected Representatives; and 2 new Delegates





Senate


- Senate has 100 Members; 51 seats needed for control
- Heading into the election, Democrats held a 51-49 majority in the Senate
- 34 Senate seats were up for election
- Republicans flipped the Senate with wins in WV, OH, PA and MT

House of Representatives


- The House has 435 Members;
 218 seats needed for control
- Heading into the election, Republicans held a 220-212 majority (there were 3 vacancies)
- Every House seat was up for election
- Republicans will maintain a narrow majority








GOP Will Have Slim Majorities for 119th Congress



Notes: The yellow dots in the Senate graphic reflect two independents who caucus with the Democrats. The gray dot in the House graphic represents the seat held by Matt Gaetz (R-FL), who resigned from the 118th Congress and has said he will not take his seat in the 119th Congress. The balance of power in the House may change in January: Rep. Mike Waltz (R-FL) intends to resign Jan. 20 to become Trump's national security adviser, and Rep. Elise Stefanik (R-NY) is also set to resign if confirmed as ambassador to the UN.




